

Webinar Regional Financial Accountability to Encourage Sustainable Waste Management in Urban Areas

As part of the Open Government Week 2025 events

Background

Waste management is a critical issue in urban governance in Indonesia. The growing volume of waste not only affects environmental conditions but also contributes to social, economic, and public health challenges. Addressing this complex problem requires an approach that goes beyond technical solutions it necessitates the reorganization of regional financial policies and management systems to become more accountable, transparent, and sustainability-oriented.

Accountability in regional public finance plays a vital role in ensuring that budgets are managed effectively and aligned with environmental and social interests. Strengthening this accountability encompasses the planning, implementation, and monitoring of regional expenditures that support sustainable waste management initiatives. Through open and participatory governance, regional financial resources can be strategically allocated to fund programs with direct and lasting impacts on environmental management.

An example of innovation can be found in the Dumai City Government through the Ecology-Based Village Budget Allocation (ALAKE) policy. This approach provides fiscal incentives to urban villages that demonstrate strong performance in environmental management, particularly in waste management. The policy aims to drive behavioral change, foster active community participation, and enhance transparency in budget utilization at the regional level

ALAKE serves as a testament to how budget accountability can be a strategic instrument for promoting improved environmental governance. Such practices should be encouraged, replicated, and further developed across various regions. In the spirit of open government, it is essential for both government and civil society to work hand in hand to create innovations that are inclusive, sustainable, and impactful for communities.

In commemoration of Open Government Week 2025, Center for Regional Information and Studies (PATTIRO) organized this activity as a platform for sharing best practices, strengthening cross-sector dialogue, and fostering collaboration to promote accountability in regional public financial management that supports environmental sustainability.
